Sad Green Cart

These Items Don't Belong (But Still Show Up):

- Bathroom products, including diapers and hygiene products
- ◆ Animal waste
- Plastic bags and kitchen catchers
- Plastic, glass, and metal food containers
- Fabrics, including reusable bags, cleaning cloths, masks, and wipes
- "Biodegradable" plastics (if not certified compostable)

Remember: A Few Wrong Items Can Contaminate the Whole Load

It's not about doing it perfectly. it's about avoiding the big mistakes.

Your Green Cart Is Not a Second Garbage Bin

If it's not compostable, it doesn't go in, even if it feels organic. Bagged organics wipes, takeout trays, and household waste send entire loads to the landfill

Happy Green Cart These Items Belong in Your Green Cart:

Food Scraps

- ◆ Fruit and veggie scraps
- Meat, bones, shellfish
- ◆ Cheese, eggs, dairy
- Bread, pasta, rice, cereal
- ◆ Coffee grounds and tea bags

Yard Trimmings

- ◆ Leaves, grass, flowers
- Garden trimmings and small branches

Food-Soiled Paper

- Napkins, paper towels
- Pizza boxes (crumbs and grease OK)
- Paper takeout containers (unlined only)

Certified Compostable Packaging & Products

 Cutlery, cups, plates and containers with the compostable logo

When in Doubt, Check the Label



® ш Look for certified compostable logos. Words like "biodegradable," "ecofriendly," or green packaging don't mean it's compostable.

If it doesn't say compostable ... it probably isn't.



- ◆ Dead plants in plastic pots
- ◆ Cake or leftovers on Styrofoam trays
- ◆ Old meat tossed with plastic wrap and pads
- ◆ Food scraps still in takeout containers
- ◆ Coffee grounds left in plastic pods

The items are compostable — the packaging isn't.

Roseridge Waste Management Commission transforms over 14,000 tonnes of organic material annually into Category A compost — a nutrient-rich product approved for unrestricted use in gardens, farms, and public landscapes across our region. This high-quality compost supports local agriculture, reduces the need for synthetic fertilizers, and enriches our soil.

However, the quality of this compost depends on what residents place in their green carts. Contaminants, including glass, metal, plastic bags, non-compostable packaging, and hygiene products compromise the composting process, leading to increased waste and reduced compost quality. By ensuring only appropriate organic materials enter the green cart, residents play a crucial role in maintaining the integrity of our compost and supporting a sustainable environment.
